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Prepare for Worship **Easter Sunday**

John 20:1-18

"Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes. But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them. 'I am ascending to my Fabrothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her."

Reflection —When Mary Magdalene first saw the resurrected Jesus, she did not recognize him, even though she knew the tomb was empty. Have you ever experienced the presence of the risen Christ, even when you were not expecting him? Are there times you have been in the presence of the risen Christ but have not recognized him? How would you know?

Morning Prayer

Jesus, victorious Lord, I exult in your resurrection.

Resurrection Faith

Pascha [or Easter] is the central event, the time of transformation, of becoming a resurrected people, God's new people. On this Sunday of all Sundays, Pascha, we celebrate our transformation as a new people. When Christ rose from the grave, death and all other "principalities and powers" that seek to entomb God's will were forever defeated.

Easter is not simply the miracle of a dead person raised from the grave, but a celebration of power that can shatter death in order that people can freely serve the God of life. In the resurrection of Christ, God's awesome purposes were on display, revealing a radically new world of peace and harmony and equality and mutuality, about which we can only dream. The Lord of the future has been disclosed to us....

On Easter we glimpse a new landscape — the age to come — and experience a sense of holy awe at the significance of the resurrection for human life. The shape of the age to come reveals a new

people of God, a new humanity.

When Christ was crucified, humanity died with him on Calvary. But on Easter morning, a new world was born — raised up with the crucified and risen Christ. Bursting the bonds of death, the first human being of a new human race, Jesus Christ, appeared among those who crucified him. In the midst of the old sin-struck world, God gave the world a new beginning, a new humanity. By faith the old guilt-ridden humanity was born again into the new forgiven humanity of Jesus Christ. Ever since, here and there, clusters of the new people of God live according to the new social order of the new age.

Therefore, Easter faith recalls the past, especially the awesome act of God in raising the crucified Christ from the grave. Easter hope looks to the promised future, to that which awaits us. Easter love celebrates the presence of the crucified and risen Christ who is now among us, reconciling us as one people. Resurrection faith asserts that by grace we are born again into the new humanity of Jesus Christ. PASTORAL LETTER

Hello again, everyone. Holy Week is here...and by the way, so are we! Thank God we had a beautiful week of spring weather allowing us to get outdoors and enjoy the rebirth of nature after what was really a pretty tame winter. It is reminding us that there is a constant in our lives when so much uncertainty about the future surrounds us. God is predictable. God doesn't turn and run in adversity like the disciples did when Jesus was arrested. God goes to the Cross with us and lifts us up from Sheol.

While in one sense, it is unfortunate that Holy Week falls during our sheltering -in-place requirement, in another sense it challenges us to be creative in our observances. I will, of course, be posting a sermon for Easter Sunday, but Maundy Thursday will occur in just three days and for me, it is the most emotionally moving day on the liturgical calendar. The Last Supper, the washing of the feet, the betrayal, Jesus' agonized praying in the garden, the arrest and the fleeing of the disciples is the climax of Jesus' ministry. No wonder it is referred to as the Passion!

I love our tradition of sharing our version of the Seder and then taking Communion by Intinction around the table. While we cannot do it together this year, we can still participate in the privacy of our homes. I will post a sermon accompanied by all of the scriptures and will include an opportunity for you to take Communion on your own. Before you listen, prepare your bread and wine and I will consecrate the elements and then give you time for prayer and reflection prior to the close of the service. It's not perfect, but what is other than God's Spirit who will be with us?

Be blessed, everyone! And be aware on the Sunday we reconvene, we will celebrate Easter whether it be May, June or whenever.


